The Conference

TBA21-Academy proposes an investigation: Could the future of the planet depend on our response to the mining operations about to be unleashed in the depths of the oceans?

During the 3rd Istanbul Design Biennial, *Are We Human*?, curated by Beatriz Colomina and Mark Wigley, TBA21-Academy is presenting the participatory conference "Design of the Seabed." The conference embarks from the hypothesis that deep sea mining is an anthropogenic intervention that will profoundly change the planet's design. It will deeply affect our futures, which are closely entangled with the oceans.

Seabed mining targets polymetallic nodules that are used in the production of batteries and alloys, and it may well be the next gold rush. Its effects will most likely be long-term and invasive, impacting ecosystems from the microbial level to the structural constitution of the seabed in a way that we are not remotely able to anticipate. Commercial exploitation of the seafloor is currently being evaluated from various positions, from multinational companies active in Papua New Guinea to a pilot test program in the Azores funded by the European Commission. The potential risks – including pollution, sediment plumes, and toxicity – have been assessed only marginally.

The conference puts these hypotheses and questions to the test with invited experts from the fields of science, technology, law, policy, the rights of nature, ecology, community, and art. With contributions in the form of talks, screenings, and remote interventions, these specialists will cast light on this highly topical and critical subject.

We invite the audience to actively take part in this discussion to consider the impacts of seabed mining and develop a position by the end of the conference.

About Thyssen-Bornemisza Art Contemporary (TBA21)

Founded in 2002 by Francesca von Habsburg in Vienna, Austria, Thyssen-Bornemisza Art Contemporary (TBA21) represents the fourth generation of the Thyssen family's commitment to the arts. After more than 14 years of collecting, commissioning projects, and engaged exhibition practice, TBA21 has established a highly respected collection of more than 700 contemporary artworks, including film, sound, mixed-media installations, sculpture, painting, photography, and performance. The foundation sustains a farreaching regional and international orientation through collaborations with other cultural partners around the world and explores modes of presentation that are intended to provoke and broaden the way viewers perceive and experience art. In 2015 von Habsburg decided that the foundation should be an agent of change and dedicated its ongoing program to the complexities and urgencies of the Anthropocene, including the pressing challenges posed by climate change, with a special focus on marine ecosystems.

TBA21-Academy was created in 2011 as an itinerant site of cultural production and interdisciplinary exchange, a fellowship organization bringing together artists, scientists, and thinkers aboard the research vessel *Dardanella*. TBA21-Academy was present during the 5th Deep Sea Mining Summit in London in April 2016 and recently gained United Nations observer status at the International Seabed Authority Assembly, becoming the first arts organization to become an observer at this UN body – an important testament to the foundation's commitment to the oceans.
